Pre-Anesthetic Blood Testing

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY.

Our greatest concern is the well being of your pet. Before putting your pet under anesthesia, we routinely perform a full physical examination. To ensure that your pet can properly process and eliminate anesthetic agents, we recommend and highly encourage *(sometimes require)* that your pet have pre-anesthetic blood testing performed prior to any anesthetic procedure. These tests confirm that your pet's organs are functioning properly. These tests also reveal hidden health conditions that could put your pet at risk.

The Pre-Anesthetic Blood Profile helps alert our doctor to the presence of dehydration, anemia, infection, diabetes, and/or kidney or liver disease that could complicate the procedure. These conditions may not be detected without a pre-anesthetic profile thus not allowing for the most appropriate and safest anesthetic regime to be administered. These tests are similar to those your own physician would run if you were to undergo anesthesia. In addition, these tests may be useful if your pet's health changes to develop faster, more accurate diagnoses and treatments. Pre-anesthetic blood work is also important for our younger pets. Some pets are born with genetic or congenital organ problems that may not show until later in life. These conditions can be worsened by anesthesia. The pre-anesthetic blood work allows us to catch these problems early and avoid exacerbation of the pet's condition with anesthesia.

The Complete Blood Count (CBC) and Pre-Anesthetic Profile which includes:

- CBC: PCV (Anemia), White Blood Cell Count (Infection), Platelet Count (Clotting Disorder)
- Profile: BUN and Creatinine (Kidney), ALKP and ALT (Liver), Glucose (Sugar), Total Protein (Dehydration)

We realize surgery and anesthesia are scary for both the owner and the patient and we attempt to make surgery day as safe and comfortable for all involved. The physical examination and blood work done prior to any surgical procedure allows us to best minimize anesthetic and surgical risks and maximize patient safety.

<u>Anesthetic Procedures & Risks</u> - We use a combination of pre-anesthetic medications/injectable and/or inhalant anesthetics to achieve optimum levels of anesthesia that are safe for your pet.

For most procedures, your pet is anesthetized and then intubated (insertion of a tube into the trachea or wind pipe). This will ensure that your pet is able to receive oxygen at all times and prevents aspiration of any fluids into the lungs. Intubation allows us to maintain anesthesia with sevoflurane, as gas anesthetic, that is very safe and is not metabolized by the body. This allows us to have more control over anesthetic depth and it is less irritating to the airways. For procedures that require minimum sedation, an injectable anesthetic is given that produces a good plan of sedation with quick recovery, and is also reversible with medication. A risk of death is possible during or after any surgical, or anesthetic procedure.

<u>Monitoring & Pain Management</u> - Monitoring of patients during anesthesia is done in two ways. First, a veterinary technician/assistant is with your pet continuously from beginning of anesthesia until recovery. Second, we have computerized monitoring equipment that records heart rate, blood pressure, oxygen levels, respiration, ECG, and body temperature. Our hospital strongly believes in compassionate, quality, medical care for our patients. As a result, all surgery patients will receive pain management before, during, and after surgery. Additionally, pain medications may be prescribed to go home with the patient. Additional information will be given at discharge. We hope this program will reduce any discomfort experienced by the pet and aid in a quicker recovery.

<u>Intravenous Catheterization & Fluids</u> - All of our surgical patients that receive general anesthesia will have an IV catheter placed and receive IV fluids during the procedure. We recommend placement of an IV catheter for all patient undergoing sedation for short procedures. This allows us to have quick, available access to the circulatory system (blood) in case of an unforeseen emergency. This fluids help provide support to the circulatory system and prevent dehydration, as well as aid in a quicker recovery from anesthesia.

Potential Surgical Complications

- 1. Spay: Bleeding, Infection, Coughing, False Pregnancy, Urinary Incontinence, Weight Gain, Suture Reactions
- 2. Castration (neuter): Bleeding, Infection, Scrotal swelling, Coughing, Suture Reaction, Weight Gain
- 3. Feline Declaw: Bleeding, Infection, Limping/Lameness, Coughing
- 4. Tumor/Lump Removal: Bleeding, Infection, Swelling and Drainage, Suture Reaction, Coughing

A Doctor or technician will be happy to discuss any potential complications with your pets specific procedure.

It is important for you to understand that there is always a risk of anesthetic and surgical complications any time these or any other procedures are performed. We strive to take the highest quality care of your pet and take all the added precautions you allow to avoid potential problems. Thank you for entrusting the care of your pet to us.
